





Comparative adjectives

We add -er to make the comparative form of most adjectives.

old - older

When adjectives finish in a short vowel and a single consonant, we double the consonant and add —er.

big - bigger

When adjectives finish in consonant + y, we change y to i and add -er.

happy - happier

With longer adjectives (other 2 syllable adjectives, or adjectives with 3+ syllables) we use more.

wonderful - more wonderful

Some adjectives have an irregular comparative form.

bad – worse good – better

We use comparative adjectives + than in sentences.

Hector is older than Paris.

Adverbs of manner

We use adverbs of manner to talk about actions. They tell us more about verbs.

Hera <u>looks</u> carefully at the golden apple.

Achilles fights Hector angrily.

We make adverbs of manner from adjectives by adding -ly.

careful - carefully

For adjectives ending in -y, we change -y to -ily.

angry – angrily

Some adverbs are irregular.

fast - fast

good - well

I'm King Priam's son, Paris. I love my father greatly My brother Hector fights well. I fight badly, but I can run fast. I love a wonderful woman – Helen. She speaks beautifully and dresses expensively. But my mother isn't very nice to her. And my sister Cassandra is afraid of her. Cassandra tells me this honestly and openly.



Paris is his killer. (= Achilles's)

Agamemnon is their great king. (= the Greeks')
